Bluff Bend Bridge Repaired And Open For Traffic



Our meetings are even easier to get to now. On Thursday, December 7 at 10 a.m. the Public Works Department reopened Bluff Bend Drive.

All work has been substantially completed with the exception of the sidewalk pedestrian rail on the east side of the road and the permanent roadway striping.

To ensure pedestrian safety, waterfilled barriers have been placed temporarily where the rail will be installed. The City plans to install the permanent pedestrian rail in early February. Roadway striping will occur in December.

Both forms of work may require a lane closure, but the road should remain open from here on out.

I have received many complaints about low hanging tree limbs scraping the tops of cars as they drive down our streets, or even worse having to drive on the other side of the street due to the low clearance.


There has been a question as to whether the homeowner or city is to trim the limbs. After speaking with our new code compliance officer, Heather Berryman, we now know the city will trim the limbs along streets, BUT it must be reported to 3-1-1 or the Street and Bridge Department.

> The Streets and Bridge operations is composed of professional and technically skilled

staff, Public Works Street and Bridge Operations manages and maintains public right-of-way infrastructure including streets, bridges, sidewalks, guardrails, trees and vegetation. Our five divisions patch potholes, resurface streets, repair utility cuts, maintain the City's medians, right-of-way maintenance on trees, and respond after storms. Services provided by Street and Bridge Operations include:

- Minor Concrete Repair & Construction
- Street Preventative Maintenance
- Right of Way Maintenance (trees + vegetation)
- Bridge Maintenance
- Alley & Roadway Repairs
- Tree Pruning & Trimming
- Sidewalk Services



Volunteer Opportunity Descriptions

Block Captain: Deliver newsletters to specified addresses quarterly. Periodically we have other announcements that need to go out to residents such as notifications about the picnics and social events, neighborhood garage sale, etc. We aim for 10-15 houses per Block Captain.

Picnics / Social: We need people to help plan, set-up and clean-up for NEWCNA social activities.

Yard of the Month: We need people to scout their neighborhood subdivision (North Oaks, Hillside, and Four Seasons) to tell us what yard they feel should receive the award each month from April to October. Come be part of the selection team!

Advertising: We need individuals who are be willing to go to businesses, especially in the surrounding area, to ask if they would like to run an advertisement in the NEWCNA quarterly newsletter. Ads help offset the cost of the newsletter.

Clean-Up: Meets periodically to collect trash and debris around the neighborhood as designated by the committee chair. Help keep our neighborhood beautiful!

Neighborhood Watch: This is set up per-block or per-street and only works if people in the designated area are willing to participate. We need at least 50% participation in an area to designate it as a Neighborhood Watch area. If you want one on your street, volunteer to help! Training will be provided.

Let us know about any other opportunities you would like to help with that will benefit NEWCNA. This is your association, it is only as good as the people who help make it great!

Abandoned Vehicle Update

On October 30, 2017 APD restarted the Vehicle Abatement Unit to handle all vehicle abatement issues city wide.

With the restart of this unit, questions, concerns, and reports regarding abandoned vehicles should be reported to 3-1-1, or the new unit at 512-974-8119.

As a city-wide number, you may have to leave a message, so please provide a description of the vehicle, its location, and the reason you believe it is abandoned. The more information you give will help the Vehicle Abatement Officers.

Below are the criteria for determining if a vehicle is "abandoned":

- 1. The vehicle is inoperable, is more than five years old, and has been left unattended on public property for more than 48 hours.
- 2. The vehicle has remained on private property without the consent of the owner or person in charge of the property for more than 48 hours.

A Vehicle Abatement Officer must determine that the vehicle is "VISIBLY" inoperable. Examples of observations are flat tires, fluids leaking, vehicles on jack stand, and obvious missing parts that will hinder the vehicle from operating.

Things that DO NOT determine if a vehicle is abandoned include:

- 1. Duration the vehicle has been parked at the location.
- 2. Expired registration/inspection

Cars parked in the front or side yards should still be reported directly to our APD district representative Adam Soliz at adam.soliz@austintexas.gov or 512-974-8143.

Front and side YARD parking is illegal in our neighborhood. NEWCNA officers are working with Councilwoman Houston's office for better enforcement of this ordinance. Municipal court fines can be given to owners of a vehicle parked in the front or side yard of a residence.

Frittata!

Here's something easy to make for breakfast or to serve at a party.

Frittata is a crust-less quiche. Its base is eggs, cheese, heavy cream, and seasonings. You can customize your frittata with chopped veggies such as onions, tomatoes, broccoli or asparagus. Add cooked bacon crumbled or cooked jimmy dean maple sausage. Always use a cheese that can be shredded. One of my favorite combinations is listed below.

8 eggs

34 cup heavy cream 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar

1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese 1 tube of jimmy dean maple sausage

1 cup diced onions

1 TSP salt

1 TSP black pepper

I TBSP crushed dried parsley

Fry the sausage into crumbles. Season with salt and pepper as you cook it, then drain.

Crack the eggs in large bowl, and whip with fork. Add cream and seasonings and mix. Mix in both cheeses, sausage and onions.

Grease a 9x9 glass pan or a deep glass pie plate. Pour frittata mixture into cooking dish. Get a piece of foil that covers the dish. Grease the foil and lay the foil on top.

Bake 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Remove foil and bake for another 5-10 minutes to brown the top a bit more if need. Use a toothpick to test the center to ensure frittata is done. If not done, continue to bake until done. Remove from oven and let rest 10 minutes before you cut and serve.

Saving Money While Still Doing Your Laundry Debra Sue Trinque

As many of you know I am all about saving the environment. Several years ago, I switched from fabric softener and dryer sheets to plastic dryer balls. These worked well, but disintegrated after a couple of years and needed to be replaced.

I recently invested in some wool dryer balls that came in a set of six and were not very expensive. The time it takes to dry a load of clothes has been reduced by 10-15 minutes. Not only am I reducing my trash, I am using less energy.

Along those same lines, I have been using a laundry ball for the past 7 years. One usually lasts 4-5 years before it begins to fall apart. I do not use any detergent, just the ball. I have to set it in the sun for 4 hours each month to recharge the silicone beads inside, but that is all the maintenance it takes. For less than \$30.00, I have 3-5 years of laundry products and I don't have to walk down that aisle of the store.

The catch is you have to get used to no suds and no scents. You can purchase lavender oil for the wool dryer balls which will impart that scent to your clothes, but I am happy to not spend money on that.

These items are readily available from places like Amazon.com and can be delivered to your door in less than a week. I hope a few of you will take a "walk on the wild side", and check out these products.
